Urban League honors Tuskegee Airman Alexander Jefferson

(WJBK) - Dedicated. Determined. Courageous. The Tuskegee Airmen were the first African-American military pilots in the United States. One of those pilots - a Detroit native who was honored last night at the Detroit Urban League's salute to Distinguished Warriors **Lt. Col. Alexander Jefferson** helped to win two wars. He fought the Nazis in the skies over Europe and returned to fight racism right here at home. They were called The Red Tails and every

time they flew, they made history. Before the Tuskegee Airmen of World War II, no African-American had ever been a United States military pilot. Urban League honors Tuskegee Airman Alexander Jefferson. "We knew that we were literally walking on quicksand because of the attitude of others of the whole society at that time," Alexander said. Their stories so famous, they've been made into films like this one about Detroit native - Lt. Col. Alexander Jefferson: "Red Tail Captured, Red Tail Free." "I'm a survivor and I realize it," he said. In 1942 Jefferson was sworn into the United States Army Reserves and in April 1943, he reported to Tuskegee Army Air Field to begin flight training. "We went through a period of nine months at Tuskegee Army Airfield where you really become a pilot," he said. The military just like the rest of the country was segregated, and some didn't believe African-American pilots could do the job - in part due to a 1925 report that made cruel and inaccurate statements. "The Army War College Evaluation of the Negro in 1925 ... held that the Black man was physically unqualified for combat duty ... mentally inferior ... could not control himself in the face of danger ... " "This is the attitude of the colonels and officers that met us and what we had to overcome," Jefferson said. Jefferson continued his training at Selfridge Army Air Field Base and it was a battle on the home front to win the respect they deserved and unappreciated. "These are the words I'll remember 'till I die, 'Gentleman this is my airfield as long as I'm in command there will be no between white and colored officers. Are there any questions?" Not long after that Jefferson was sent to Europe assigned to the 332nd "Red Tail" fighter group: "My role was a fighter pilot, escorting the bombers from Italy to Germany, Italy to Czechoslovakia, flying P51 Mustangs, having a heck of a good time," Jefferson said. The Red Tails were fierce, skilled fighter pilots known for their bravery, protecting and clearing pathways for bombers. Jefferson flew 18 missions but on his 19th, he was shot down. "That's where German 20 mm came up through the floor and went out through the top of the ceiling," Jefferson said. "And the darn fire came up out of the floor, burned the gloves. I had to pull up and bail out." He



spent the rest of the war in a POW camp, drawing pictures to occupy his time. After being liberated by Gen. George Patton in April of 1945, he saw the worst of humanity. "You could smell it a mile before you got there, because the ovens were still warm," he said. "A room in the barracks piled high with eyeglasses, another room filled with shoes, railroad cars with the doors locked filled with bodies. Dachau (concentration camp)." The war was over, but for Jefferson and the other African-American pilots, they were returning home to another fight. "Two or three thousand men jubilant," he said. "We get into the harbor in New York, the Statue of Liberty, and going down the gangplank at the bottom a little white soldier off! "After ping months in Germany as a prisoner of war sage."

(saying) 'Whites to the right and (n-words) to the left.' "After nine months in Germany as a prisoner of war, segregation, segregation, segregation." It was a cold homecoming - but their impact couldn't be denied. Their record of excellence led to the desegregation of the Armed Forces. In 1948 President Harry Truman signed an executive order ending segregation in the military. The Tuskegee Airmen - who always knew "failure was not an option" helped write that history. "When we leave, we hope we leave a good trail," Jefferson said. A decorated serviceman - Alexander Jefferson is a man of discipline, dedication and determination. A family man. A man of faith. A teacher who helps us all learn from the past so we can help build a brighter, more inclusive future. "I've had a darn, good stinking life," he said. "God has been very good to me."



Alexander Jefferson

Alexander Jefferson, Lieutenant Colonel USAF Retired, born Detroit, Michigan, 15 November 1921.

Graduate; Chadsey High School Detroit: Bachelor of Science Degree, Clark College, Atlanta, Georgia: Graduate work in Chemistry, Howard University Washington DC: M.S. of Education; Wayne State University, Detroit.

In January 1944, graduated from pilot training course at Tuskegee Army Air Field followed by three months of Combat Training at Selfridge Field, Michigan. He served as a P-51 fighter pilot with the Red Tail, 332nd Fighter Group, 301st Fighter Squadron in Ramitelli, Italy. In the course of providing protection from enemy aircraft, he flew 18 long range escort missions for B-17 and B-24 bombers. On August 12, 1944, three days prior to the invasion of Southern France, he was shot down by ground fire while strafing radar stations on the coast. Captured by German troops and interned for nine months as a prisoner of war, he spent the first five months in Stalag Luft III, 80 miles east of Berlin on the Odor River.

On January 29, 1945, when the Russians started their offensive, the prisoners, American, British and French, were transferred to Stalag VIIA, Mooseburg, approximately 20 miles north of Dachau. Liberated by American forces on the 29th of April 1945, he visited Dachau to witness the results of the atrocities committed by the Nazis.

He was discharged from active duty in 1947 and retired from the reserves in 1969 with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel.

Following the war, he became in an elementary school science teacher in the City of Detroit. He retired as an assistant principal in 1979. He is an active member of various church, educational and alumni organizations. He is one of the founders of the Detroit Chapter of the Tuskegee Airman (which is the original chapter) and is a member of the Tuskegee Airman Speaker Bureau.

As a Life Member of the Silver Falcon Association, he served on a voluntary basis as an Admissions Counselor for the United States Air Force Academy. He is a Life Member of American Ex-Prisoner of War and is a Perpetual Member of the Military Order of the World Wars. On October 14, 1995, he was enshrined into the Michigan Aviation Hall of Fame.

John L. Harrison Jr., of the famed Tuskegee Airmen, dies

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — John L. Harrison Jr., who served as a World War II pilot with the famed all-black Tuskegee Airmen, has died. He was 96. Harrison died March 22 at a hospice in Philadelphia, according to the Murphy Ruffenach Funeral Home. A funeral with military honors was held Friday. Harrison was 22 when he became one of America's first black military airmen, one of nearly 1,000 pilots who trained as a segregated unit with the Army Air Forces at an airfield near Tuskegee, Alabama. "We were Americans, we were young, and we wanted to defend our country, just like everyone else," Harrison said in a 2009 oral history. Fellow Tuskegee airman Eugene Robinson said that

becoming a pilot was a childhood dream of Harrison's after seeing airplanes in Omaha, Nebraska, where he grew up, and reading in a magazine about black men being trained as pilots. Robinson said it was a big dream for a black child during segregation. "He wanted to fly an airplane, like so many young people," Robinson said. Harrison saw combat in Italy during World War II and remained in the service until his retirement as an Air Force major after two decades. He flew all types of planes, including prop fighters, jet fighters, twin-engines, four engines and sea planes. His family said Harrison crossed the Pacific Ocean more than 50 times, and the Atlantic Ocean 35 times as a pilot for the Military Air Transport Service. Harrison was stationed and traveled in Europe, Asia, Africa and the Arctic. He also served as an officer and a director for the Peace Corps, based in East Africa. He worked in the administrations of President Richard Nixon and Pennsylvania Gov. Dick Thornburgh, and as director of affirmative action for the Boeing Aircraft Company. In 2007, the Tuskegee Airmen were awarded the Congressional Gold Medal, the nation's highest civilian honor. President George W. Bush saluted the then-300 surviving airmen at a ceremony in the Capitol, and apologized for "all the unreturned salutes and unforgivable indignities" they had endured.

Why I Fly Young Eagles

"My neighbor, Robert Shurney, a NASA engineer, got a friend of his to take me flying in his Cessna 172 when I was 12 years old. After that flight I spent many hours building airplanes and rockets. I eventually earned a Ph.D. in biomedical engineering, and later in life I dedicated myself to educating other underrepresented youth to careers in aviation.

"I started EAA Chapter 1351 around the turn of the century with the sole purpose of doing Young Eagles rallies. Several of the Young Eagles I flew went on to pursue careers in aviation, and several are in the Tuskegee Airmen Flight Academy, an aviation program run by the Tuskegee Airmen National Museum, where a dedicated student can earn a pilot certificate."

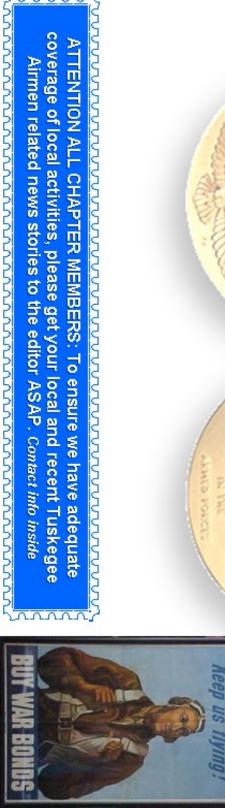
